APA style

- 
- The APA (American Psychological Association) is used for writing scientific papers, laboratory reports and papers .

# General Rules

- Arrange in alphabetical order by the surname of the author or title (if there is no author)
- References cited in the text **MUST** appear in the reference list
- Use **n.d** for no date
- Ignore **The, A, An** when alphabetizing the list.
- Double space your reference list

# BOOKS

- AUTHOR-use the last name and first initial, list all authors
- TITLE- Capitalize the first word
- PUBLISHER- use full name
- PLACE OF PUBLICATION-list state abbreviations
- PAGES -list first page and additional pages
- DATES- follows authors name

authors:

last name, initials.

(date).

Place of publication:

name of publisher.

# Chapter in a book

authors of the chapter:  
last name, initials.

(date). Title of the chapter they wrote.

Clifasefi, S.L. & Parker, S. (2009). Placebos and memory. In M.R. Kelley (Ed.), *Applied memory*. (pp. 109-129).

(pp. start page - end page of chapter).

Name of book's editor(s):  
initials, last name (Ed.)  
if more than one editor you would  
need to write (Eds.)



# PERIODICALS

- Magazines, Journals, newspapers
- Authors are named by their last name followed by initials;
- Publication year goes between parentheses and is followed by a period.
- The title of the article is written with only the first word and nouns to be capitalized.
- Include the volume number and the page numbers



- When information is quoted or referred to in a paper, briefly identify the source and allow the reader to locate the full citation in your reference list.

Author's surname and year of publication, full information about the source in the reference list

**Direct quotation:**  
Words in quotation marks, to indicate use of author's original words

Hong Kong cinema is the martial arts film, which has undergone a number of changes in style and content over the past 40 years, ranging from straightforward action to kung fu horror (Riley, 2004).

Page number  
-shows the exact location of a direct quotation

In order to understand the popularity of such films, it is useful to examine the place of kung fu in Hong Kong's sporting history.

**Paraphrase /summary:**  
Idea from source, expressed in your own words

**Reference list:**  
Provides full information for all of the in-text citations, usually at the end of the assignment
