The St. John's Senior Eagles came in soaring during this year's football season, going 4-0 before the finals. Fans were able to see the team claim their victory against North Park Collegiate and Paris District High School and could frequently catch their games at the Bison's Alumni Field or at PDHS field. The season started as early as September 22, and ended on November 1st. Although the outcome of the season was unexpected by many, there is no denying how strong of a team the Eagles are.

With final scores of 40 - 6 (SJC) and 41- 0 (SJC) in games one and two, against NPC and PDHS, the team proved themselves incredibly capable early in the season. Notable players of week one and two consisted of Tyson Dyck and Carter Kellam on offence, and Alex Muir and Zack Kaman on defense.

The last two games before semi-finals saw more green spirit, with stats of 21-44 against BCI, and 7-42 against ACS. Outstanding players of weeks three and four, included Carter Kellam and Corson Hawes;





GIRLS FIELD HOCKEY MAKES DEBUT AT SJC

For the first time ever, St. John's College welcomed a girls' field hockey team into the halls, and onto the fields of SJC. Joining the league as the fourth team in the AABHN, the Eagles played a total of four games, including a semi-final match. Coaches Mrs. Hutchinson and Mrs. Malecki both agreed that "Although it was a steep learning curve, we all had lots of fun learning how to play the game and connecting as a team."

New to the game, SJC played their first match against the Hagersville Hurricanes at Kiwanis Field on October 2, 2023. Following a penalty shootout, the game surprisingly ended in a Hurricanes loss, despite Haggersville being the most experienced team in the league. After Olivia Bullock scored the first goal of the game, Hagersville was able to tie it up, sending the teams to a shootout. With the first shooter up, Alexia Karmiris was able to score the only goal of the shootouts, leading her team to their first victory ever! St. John's was off to a 1–0 record to start their season.

On October 10th, the Eagles played a second game against the McKinnon Park Devils, a team they would face again later in the season semi-finals. Once again, Bullock scored the first goal making it 1–0. The Devils caught up and made it 1–1, until the last play of the game. The Devils were able to score off a penalty corner, gaining a hard-fought victory over the Eagles, with a 2–1 win.

The third game of the season pitted SJC against the reigning champions: the Assumption College Lions. Heading into that game, the team anticipated a challenge, but kept their heads up, and aimed to focus on their goal. The Eagles put up an excellent fight, with Bullock scoring in the first half of the game. Unfortunately, the team fell short, losing 3-1.

On October 17th, the Eagles and the Devils went head-to-head in a semi-final playoff game. Despite the Eagles having three starting players on the bench due to injuries, the girls still managed to dominate the field for most of the game. Sadly, they were unable to get a clear shot on the net. In the second half of the game, the Devils were able to score and advance to the finals.

While it was a short-lived season that lasted only three weeks, the SJC Eagles were able to quickly form a team of inexperienced players and dive headfirst into a sport they had never played before. Coaches Hutchinson and Malecki both agreed that they are, "excited to learn more about the game" and "continue to advance with the team next year."
