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RELAY FOR LIFE

PASSING THE BATON TO 2025

On March 26, SJC students and staff filled the cafetorium for 2025's Relay for Life kick-off assemblies. Led by Mr. MacKinlay, the assemblies featured students and staff speaking passionately about the purpose of Relay for Life and how raising funds to fight cancer directly supports our own immediate friends and family fighting to recover and stay healthy in the face of this pervasive disease. Indeed, cancer is so pervasive among Canadians that two in five people will at some point in their lives be diagnosed with it. Not that we in the SJC community need a statistic to remind us of cancer's devastating proximity. As each student speaker movingly reminded us, the stories of this disease are

our own stories, accounts of resilience to be sure but also recollections of lives cut short, of departures happening way too soon.

And then Mr. MacKinlay opened a time capsule. Well, not a real, buried in the earth time capsule, Instead, it was a Canadian Cancer Society promotional video from SJC's 2002 Relay for Life. But like a time capsule, the video allowed 2025's students to look backwards through time and catch a glimpse of an SJC their parents' generation would easily recognize. Though nearly 25 years have passed since then, the camera lens revealed a school with students who looked surprisingly familiar: they wore the same uniforms; they walked (most of) the same halls; they even sounded like teenagers still sound. Curiously, however, the only phone in the school seemed to have been a single, antiquated payphone mounted in the gym hallway. The phone line-ups in 2002 must have been so very long.

Surface observations aside, Relay for Life's twenty-three-year-old SJC video testified to the continuity of SJC's care. Like a bridge between past and present, the video linked the community SJC was with the community SJC is today. The Canadian Cancer Society video bears witness to a 2002 community mobilizing on behalf of the people they loved. In 2025, the SJC community is still rallying canadienne and still living out its care.

THE JUNIOR AND SENIOR BASKETBALL TEAMS' SEASON TRAJECTORIES

The basketball season was off to a strong start in the nest, with both the junior and senior boys' teams making their mark in the AABHN. While the juniors dominated with a perfect record, the senior team navigated a challenging but promising start.

The junior boys' team, led by Coach Candice Wright, had set the tone early going undefeated with a 6-0 record. A key win included a 72–36 victory over North Park to kick off the season. Coach Wright accredits their success to their defensive strength and team unity.

"Speaking for the junior team, our full-court pressure is good so far, defensively, we are really good in our press break," Coach Wright shared in a interview from back in December. "We have a lot of talented players so during any given game, anyone can step up and score for us." She also shared how, "[t]he players have gelled together quickly, especially since many have played together outside of school," which she stated has helped a lot and can also be attributed to the team's success up to that point. With city championships and CWOSSA on the horizon, Wright highlighted consistency as their biggest focus. "We've had a lot of success at the start of the season, but just staying consistent to ensure we are continuing to get better in preparation for what's to come."

The senior team, with a 4-2 record, experienced both triumphs and opportunities for growth as a team. They started the season with an exciting 61–52 win over North Park, and a 91–64 victory against Pauline Johnson. However, tough losses to Assumption and BCI highlighted areas to work on for the team.

Both teams at SJC demonstrated their potential to

achieve greatness. The juniors were riding high on momentum, while the seniors were eager to bounce back and make a deep playoff run. With strong coaching, talented rosters, and a supportive school community, the Eagles were ready to soar through the season.

The clear favourites among the students enthusiastic about **engineering** include University of Toronto and University of Waterloo. These universities promote innovation in their world-renowned programs and great co-op opportunities.



University of Toronto

McGill, UBC, and Alberta were also noticed for their innovative research and varied engineering streams. Yet, if students are looking for schools that move at a more comfortable pace, places such as Ryerson, Concordia, and Guelph serve as proof that quality education can be achieved through universities that are more approachable.

A DEEP DIVE INTO GRADE 12 NON-TRADITIONAL VISUAL ART AND PORTFOLIO CLASS

Every year, St. John's College organizes its annual Art Show, a celebration of our talented student artists and their innovative and boundary-pushing creations. This event showcases the hard work of students who spent the semester exploring different types of mediums and mastering techniques to create truly unique pieces. The Grade 12 Non-Traditional Visual Art or Portfolio Class offers students a space to take creative risks, think outside the box, and redefine the meaning of art. In an interview, Hazel, a Grade 12 student, described the class atmosphere:

"It's a fun place, where [we] could experiment with [our] art, then Mr. D, will come over once in a while [to have a look and] critique what [we] are doing, and tell [us] what we should be working on, and what to improve [in our artwork]. I think it's a really good place where we could experiment with new mediums and figure out what our art style will be and what we want to do moving forward."

Jorja, a Grade 12 student, shared her perspective on the Portfolio Class, explaining, "[It's a class where] you create art to help you [build a portfolio] for future career or any art-related programs"

Katie, a returning student, also reflected on the unique atmosphere of the class, saying, "Everyone in this class has their own world. The atmosphere is hard to explain, it's very group-based in a way that few choose to be their own individual. But this class is great! We can create art without following any criteria, we create art with purpose I guess"

The Portfolio Class provides a space for students to experiment with new ideas, materials, and techniques without being confined by rules. It's an environment that encourages them to explore their identity as artists and draw inspiration from unexpected places. When asked about her sources of inspiration, Katie shared, "Mr. D doesn't like hearing this but most of us do find art inspiration on Pinterest, there are a lot of unknown artists who also upload their art on that platform so sometimes I get inspiration there. But on a serious note, I get ideas and inspiration from impressionist artists."

On the other hand, Hazel offered her perspective, saying, "Personally, I'm a bit all over the place. I kind of like the new stuff, well, not new, but abstract expressionism. I think it's nice to see [artists] kind of let go of their art and make it more about them rather than the subject." Whether it's impressionist artists, abstract expressionism, or even resources like Pinterest, these sources play a significant role in shaping the meaning and individuality behind each student's work.




