

## OSSLT Summary Tip Sheet: Writing

<b><u>Summary Writing</u></b> (30 points content / 20 points conventions)	<b><u>News Article</u></b> (60 points content / 40 points conventions)	<b><u>Opinion Writing</u></b> (60 points content / 40 points conventions)
<p><b>Purpose:</b> to identify the main idea and provide a specific, supporting detail from the text to support it.</p> <p><b>Remember:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>❖ The main idea is usually stated in the first paragraph (and hinted at in the title).</li><li>❖ Use specific details from the text to support the main idea (consider using short, direct quotations from the text).</li></ul> <p><b>Format:</b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1. Restate the article title + action word + main idea.</li><li>2. Use at least one (aim for two) specific examples from the text that explains/supports the main idea.</li><li>3. Concluding sentence: restate the main idea.</li></ol>	<p><b>Purpose:</b> to provide critical, unbiased information about an event to an adult reader.</p> <p><b>Remember:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>❖ The article must relate to <b><u>BOTH</u></b> the headline and the picture given to you</li><li>❖ A news article is written about an event that has already occurred, therefore it is written in the <b><u>past tense</u></b></li><li>❖ A reporter only presents simple, true facts; no opinions are given (unless it is a direct quotation from someone who was at the event).</li><li>❖ Paragraphs are short: 2-3 sentences each.</li><li>❖ <u>Make up specific details</u>: full names of people, names of school/city, ages/grades etc.</li></ul> <p><b>Format:</b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1. The Placeline: states where the event took place</li><li>2. The Lead: states the who, what, where, and when of the event.</li><li>3. Body Paragraphs (3 paragraphs)<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>- give more specific information about the event: the why and how</li><li>- give at least 2 quotes from someone who was there.</li></ul></li><li>4. The conclusion: safety tip, contact information, what might happen in the future? (Remember this must be a fact).</li></ol>	<p><b>Purpose:</b> to state and explain your opinion on a given topic using specific facts, details, and examples.</p> <p><b>Remember:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>❖ Take a <u>strong opinion</u> (pick only one side).</li><li>❖ Briefly plan/outline your opinion and supporting points <u>before</u> you begin writing in the rough notes section.</li><li>❖ Use <u>transition words</u> at the start of each body paragraph &amp; between points to connect ideas and create smooth flow in your writing.</li><li>❖ When finished, edit to check for <u>spelling and grammar</u>.</li><li>❖ Write in complete sentences.</li><li>❖ You may write in first person (use I).</li></ul> <p><b>Format:</b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1. Introduction (4 sentences).<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>- Clearly state your opinion</li><li>- State your 3 supporting reasons; each stated in a separate sentence.</li></ul></li><li>2. Body Paragraph 1 (point, proof, comment).<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>- State your first point</li><li>- Give a specific facts/examples to support your point.</li><li>- Explain, in detail, how these facts prove your opinion.</li></ul></li><li>3. Body Paragraph 2 (point, proof, comment).<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>- State your second point</li><li>- Give a specific facts/examples to support your point.</li><li>- Explain, in detail, how these facts prove your opinion.</li></ul></li><li>4. Body Paragraph 3 (point, proof, comment).<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>- State your third point</li><li>- Give a specific facts/examples to support your point.</li><li>- Explain, in detail, how these facts prove your opinion.</li></ul></li><li>5. Conclusion Paragraph (4 sentences).<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>- restate your opinion &amp; summarize each supporting reason in separate sentence.</li></ul></li></ol>
<p><b><u>Short Writing Task</u></b> (30 points content/20 points conventions)</p> <p><b>Purpose:</b> to answer a question based on a reading selection.</p> <p><b>Remember:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>❖ Use part of the question to begin your answer.</li><li>❖ To answer these questions, you will need to make inferences and connections within the text.</li></ul> <p><b>Format:</b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1. Use part of the question to begin your answer.</li><li>2. Use specific examples from the text to support your answer.</li></ol>		

## OSSLT Summary Tip Sheet: Reading

### General Tips

- ❖ As you read, underline, highlight, and make notes on the text (nothing you write on the text will be graded)
- ❖ If you come across a word you don't know, try to use the entire sentence to help you figure out the meaning of the word.
  - try to "break the word down" into its root word
  - use prefixes/suffixes to help you 'decode' it.
- ❖ Carefully read questions, and highlight what each question is specifically asking
- ❖ Use the rough notes space to organize/brainstorm before writing. Use graphic organizers (t-charts for opinion) to help you organize your thinking.
- ❖ Answer each question to the best of your ability
- ❖ When finished, go back over each question, and edit your writing for spelling, grammar, and content.
- ❖ Remember: reading selections are only graded for content, not conventions (as long as mistakes don't interfere with your content).
- ❖ TAKE ADVANTAGE OF THE EXTRA TIME!

### Multiple Choice

- ❖ Highlight what the question is asking you.
- ❖ Cross off answers you know are incorrect.
- ❖ Pay close attention to what the question is asking: there may be only small differences between correct and incorrect answers.
- ❖ If you are unsure, start by eliminating answers you know are incorrect, and then go back to the text to look for more information to help you answer the question.
- ❖ If you are deciding between two possible answers, choose the best one.
- ❖ Always guess – never leave an answer blank!
- ❖ Mark questions you are unsure of, and come back to them when you review your booklet.

### Graphic Text

- ❖ Examine title, headings, pictures, captions, and images.
- ❖ Think about what you already know about the topic
- ❖ Read all labels: pay close attention to bold type, capitals, and larger font.
- ❖ Follow arrows and lines: think about how they are used to show connections, direction, movement, etc.
- ❖ Identify the relationship between visuals and information presented.
- ❖ Examine symbols: look for legends/keys to help aid your understanding.
